## FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR JANICE




CHRIST IS RISEN! JESUS IS ALIVE! REJOICE IN WHAT THE LORD HAS DONE!

Jesus Is Our Redemption: In the temple Jesus said, "If anyone keeps my Word, he will never see death" [John 8:51]. For Jesus came to taste death for us—to drink the cup of suffering to the dregs in

order that we might be released from its power. Clinging to His life-giving words, we are delivered from death's sting and its eternal judgment. ## FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR KAY



Have you seen the Jesus Revolution movie yet? I actually preached on the Jesus Revolution of the 60s last summer when I was previewing Ecclesiastes chapter 3, so I was super excited when I heard about it, and I was blessed to see this amazing movie last week. To be honest, I wasn't ready for it to be as really good as it was. But I can honestly say it was a GOOD movie.

The box office numbers are surprising everyone. This movie is a hit. But more than that, it's inspiring to both young and old. Don't make the mistake of thinking this movie is only for the 60+ crowd who witnessed the actual <u>Jesus movement</u> of the late '60s and early '70s. This movie can deeply impact all ages.

Watching the movie, I realized there are so many similarities between the hippies of yesteryear and teens of today. Both generations are open, honest, and looking for answers. Both are looking for purpose, transcendence, and hope. Both endured large-scale traumas (a perceived unjust war combined with the battle for Civil Rights for the hippies and the trauma of Covid-inspired lockdowns and isolation for our teenagers). Both tend to be looking for answers in all the wrong places. And both have begun to realize that those wrong places don't satisfy.

When the "hippies" started coming to an end of themselves and seeing that the aftermath of drugs, sex, and rock 'n' roll wasn't filling the gaping holes in their souls, many were open to joining the Jesus movement.

Sometimes you have to hit rock bottom, flat on your back, before you can look up. That's what happened with the Jesus movement. When people realized that LSD didn't bring them transcendence; that communal living didn't bring them peace, and countercultural chants didn't change a thing, many were willing to give Jesus a chance.

The results are, well, historic. I believe the same thing is happening today. People are hitting rock bottom of isolation and depression. Despite being ultra-connected, we are the loneliest generation on record. Last month, I took part in a Suicide and Teens conference where the CDC indicated that **57% of teenage girls in the U.S. felt** "**persistently sad or hopeless.**" Around 30% of girls admit they've seriously considered taking their own lives. The bad news is that today's youth is flat on its back, knocked down by sadness, loneliness, and anxiety. The good news is that now they can look up to Jesus.

Now is the time for another Jesus movement! Now is the time to take our young people to this amazing movie (if you haven't already!). Why not take your family to a Saturday afternoon showing? Maybe everybody can dress up like hippies! Hehe! Please send me pictures!) And start simple revival conversations.

Ask questions like:

What would it take to see another Jesus revolution in this generation?

2. What are the roadblocks to this kind of revival?

How can we begin to live this out in our community?

And pray! Spend time in prayer, asking God to start that revival in your hearts and

through our congregation and community! Then ask each family member to identify one person they want to share Jesus with this week. Why? "Because it ain't revival until it spills into the streets!"

And if you can't find the time to see the movie, but others in your family want to see it, let me know. I will definitely go to see it again!

#### TRUSTEES MEETING February 19, 2023 – 8:00 am

Peter Fannin called the meeting to order at 8:02 a.m. followed by prayer led by Pastor Janice.

Officers were nominated as follows: President, Pete Fannin; Vice President, Patty Beck; Secretary, Tom Anderson and Treasurer, Brian Knight. Enoch motioned to cast a unanimous ballot for the nominated members, seconded by Beck. Motion carried.

Secretary's report was presented. Knight made a motion to approve the Jan. 15 meeting minutes with the following correction: date changed to January 15. Enoch seconded the motion, motion carried.

The treasurer's report was presented. Anderson made a motion to approve, seconded by Enoch. Motion carried

#### Old Business:

The kitchen stove project was discussed. More discussion will be held concerning if we need the stoves right now, cost, etc.

The trustees are in agreement to the procedure of calling in advance to Pastor Janice who will then contact one of the trustees or Jackie to make arrangements to have the building open when needed.

#### New Business:

The Men's Ministry raffle is under way to raise funds for community outreach and benevolence. The drawing will be September 10, 2023.

Next meeting will be held on March 19, 8 a.m., and will be a joint meeting with the Elders.
